Review of first half 2010

1) Trainings on FOSS Business Models: from the Regional to the National Trainings

In 2009 ict@innovation achieved a major milestone by successfully conducting four regional training of trainers on Advanced African FOSS Business Models. Now the 80 FOSS Business Models Trainers from 10 different countries in Southern and East Africa are preparing for the national roll-out, to spread the knowledge on FOSS Business Models in their countries.

2) Publication of the Handbook “ict@innovation: Free your IT Business in Africa!”



This year's Idlelo4 conference on FOSS and the Digital Commons (May 17th–21st in Accra, Ghana) presented the perfect occasion to launch the training handbook: “ict@innovation: Free your IT Business in Africa!” The training handbook has been collaboratively developed by more than 50 FOSS experts from Africa and beyond, who have contributed their expertise and helped to put together a wealth of knowledge with detailed examples and case studies of FOSS entrepreneurs from all across the African continent, model presentations, assessment tests, exercises and assignments.

Nnenna Nwakanma, FOSSFA Council Chair, acknowledged this book as a great joint achievement and its meaning for ICT businesses in Africa.

“Free your IT-Business in Africa!” is a comprehensive starting point for anyone planning to start an IT business around Open Source technologies. The book consists of different training modules divided into three thematic parts:

The first part - African FOSS Business Models - introduces basic FOSS concepts and provides practical case studies across the African continent.

The second part - Knowledge and Skills for FOSS Entrepreneurs – focuses on FOSS communication and business skills which are vital for businesses and contribute immensely in helping young entrepreneurs leverage FOSS to gain a competitive advantage. Innovative and cost effective tools and techniques, community building and networking, and FOSS strategies which are vital for starting and sustaining a viable FOSS business in Africa are also covered in this part of the syllabus.

The third part - FOSS Training as a Business – aims to foster understanding of some of the requirements for becoming a FOSS trainer, and identifies the opportunities that exist for FOSS training as a business in Africa and further introduces a global look at Linux training worldwide. It is particularly suitable for Training-of-Trainers and for advanced courses within ICT-associations, training institutions as well as universities.

In the spirit of sharing and mutual capacity-building, the training material is released under a Creative Commons Attribution-Share Alike licence. Therefore, distribution, remixing and updating of the materials by you is encouraged.

3) Appointment FOSS Certification Manager and next steps towards regional trainings

In April, Mr Evans Ikua, the new ict@innovation Certification Manager, has taken up work. Since then, much progress on FOSS Certification has been achieved and a roadmap for activities developed. During the next months, open training materials for LPI examinations will be compiled and regional trainings held. In addition, a long-term strategy for FOSS certification in Africa is being developed in close cooperation with the FOSSFA network. 4) Supporting the local development of FOSS Applications through the AVOIR / ict@innovation Mentored Internship Programme

On the 28th and 29th of April representatives from nine **African Virtual Open Initiatives and Resources (AVOIR)** nodes gathered at University of Western Cape for a two-day workshop to plan a joint Mentored Internship Programme of ict@innovation and the AVOIR Network.

Aim of the Mentored Internship Programme is to qualify African FOSS experts in the development of innovative local FOSS solutions. It will improve the coders' skills to apply what they learn in theory to "real world problems". The activity aims to motivate more African developers to contribute to FOSS projects and develop more high-quality African FOSS solutions.

The planning workshop mobilized expertise from across the continent located within the AVOIR nodes – from Nigeria to Kenya, Mozambique to Rwanda, and Uganda to South Africa. The two days were a think tank of ideas and planning. A concrete action plan was devised, which included the content and curricula of the Mentored Internship Programme as well as mapping the first phase of intern recruitments. The pilot phase of the Mentored Internship Program launches at the beginning of October 2010.

Outlook 2010

The year 2010 will be a busy and exciting period, as we are looking forward to the further implementation of a number of programme activities. Here is a short overview:

African FOSS Business Models

- The second phase of Pillar A will commence with trainings being held on the national level in autumn 2010.

FOSS Certification

- The implementation of FOSS Certification activities will begin shortly with a compilation of open training materials and training-of-trainers for Linux Professional Institute Certification (LPIC) Level 1.

Local FOSS Applications and Software Development

- The pilot phase of the Mentored Internship Programme with the AVOIR network will commence in October 2010.
